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TOWN OF MOUNTAIN VILLAGE MINUTES OF THE JUNE 9, 2020 GREEN TEAM MEETING DRAFT

The meeting of the Green Team Committee was called to order by Cath Jett on Tuesday, June 9, 2020 at 2:04 p.m. via Google Hangouts.

Public Comment on Non-Agenda Items:

No public comment was received however, the public will be able to comment at the end of each agenda item.

Consideration of Approval of Minutes:

Agenda Item 3- May 12, 2020 Green Team Committee Meeting Minutes

On a **MOTION** by Mike Follen and seconded by Inga Johansson, the Green Team Committee voted unanimously to approve the May 12, 2020 meeting minutes as presented.

Discussion and Committee Follow Up/Next Steps:

- > <u>Agenda Item 4-</u> Creation of a Temporary Secretary Position:
 - **NEXT STEPS:** Cath Jett presented this item to the committee and discussion took place.
 - At their May 14th meeting, the Town Council agreed to reorganize staff and eliminate support for the Green Team until such a time that staffing levels can be returned to normal.
 - Heidi Stenhammer has offered to take meeting minutes.

On a **MOTION** by Jonathan Greenspan and seconded by Jeff Proteau, the Green Team Committee voted unanimously to appoint Heidi Stenhammer as the Green Team Committee Secretary.

- Agenda Item 5- Joint Meeting with the Ecology Commission in July:
 - **NEXT STEPS:** Cath Jett presented this item to the committee and discussion took place.
 - The meeting has been set for July 1st at 4pm. All present, except for Heidi Stenhammer, confirmed they could attend.
 - The purpose of the meeting is to share initiatives, determine duplicities, work through the COVID plan and determine how we can collaborate.
 - Jonathan Greenspan and Cath Jett will work with Kiersten Talbert to create an agenda.
- Agenda Item 6- 2020 April June: 2nd Quarter Green Team Quarterly Report. Present in JULY
 - **NEXT STEPS:** Cath Jett presented this item to the committee and discussion took place.
 - Historically this report has been approved by the Green Team one month before Council meets and it could be done the week prior so that it is more relevant.
 - It was noted that the annual work plan should be presented to Town Council in December, so the Green Team is able to "hit the ground running" in January.
 - Inga Johansson noted that she has been doing the Green Tips through her blog. Zoe Dohnal will send out the link to the Green Team so others can sign up for Green Tips.

On a **MOTION** by Heidi Stenhammer seconded by Marti Prohaska, the Green Team Committee voted unanimously to approve the 2nd Quarter Green Team Quarterly Report.

- > <u>Agenda Item 7-</u> State and Western Slope Recycling Committees Updates:
 - **NEXT STEPS:** Jonathan Greenspan presented this item to the committee and discussion took place.
 - Bills tied to budgetary items will struggle due to massive budget cuts. Non-monetary bills with popular consent will likely make it through with some items rolling into next year.
 - The preemption bill did not make it to the floor.
 - The Western Slope Council for Recycling committee has been formed and is the first one of its type on this side of the State. It has 100 members throughout the Western Slope which has about 55% of Colorado's land territory but only 13% of the population. This means that there are great distances to cover when transporting recycling which is being carefully tracked.
 - This new committee is vetting an app called Love Zero Waste out of Vail. People are pooling their info with it such as who is having a recycling event and when.
 - There is another app which has a public grading system of a business regarding their use or lack thereof using environmentally friendly products.

- Jonathan will send out links to these apps.
- Kris Holstrom and Jonathan Greenspan recently met with Grace Franklin, the SMC Public Health Director who is leading safety protocols. Studies have shown that plastic holds the virus the longest which is why Bruin temporarily stopped collecting recycling. Grace has agreed to team up with us to explore the possibility of allowing restaurants to accept someone's personal container for to-go use.
- Agenda Item 8- Request/Reminder to Sign Up for Farm to Community Shifts:
 - **NEXT STEPS:** Cath Jett presented this item to the committee and discussion took place.
 - <u>Please sign up here.</u>
- > <u>Agenda Item 9-</u> Meadows Beaver Update:
 - **NEXT STEPS:** Jeff Proteau presented this item to the committee and discussion took place.
 - Jeff noted that TSG will not support removal of the beaver dam in the Meadows. He is going to work with the Town to install a beaver deceiver so the level of water can be controlled to frustrate the beavers and send them upstream.
 - TSG purchased a beaver deceiver from Clemson University and installed it at hole 13 with great success.
 - Jonathan noted that HOA's such as Spring Creek spent 3-4k trying to protect the forest and lost over 35 trees because of the beavers.
 - Jeff noted that, due to an EPA consent decree, TSG rebuilt prospect creek to encourage beavers to come back which EPA considered a huge success. TSG built the bridge there for access to either side of the wetland area and, if that is in jeopardy, be short-term mitigation may be necessary.
- Agenda Item 10- Planet Over Plastics Subcommittee Update:
 - **NEXT STEPS:** Inga Johansson presented this item to the committee and discussion took place.
 - This subcommittee has been in a stand still due to COVID-19.
 - A meeting will be held next week with the volunteers and data collection could start back up soon.
 - The training tool kit is being worked on and efforts are being focused on a marketing campaign for awareness and education.
 - Shifting to long-term reusable solution for common consumption cups but there is a big need for consensus on where the Town stands. Collaboration efforts are also underway with the Town of Telluride.
 - Upstream and Rethink Disposable are two different companies this committee could choose from to create an alliance. Then, businesses could be encouraged to participate. Grant options for whole community participation could be investigated.

- Jeff noted that TSG Works with the Brendle Group out of Boulder, CO for innovative sustainability solutions and carbon footprint reduction. He encouraged Inga to reach out to them.
- > Agenda Item 11- Town Clean Up Subcommittee Update
 - **NEXT STEPS:** Mike Follen presented this item to the committee and discussion took place.
 - Moving forward with the cleanup event on August 22nd which will be an entirely volunteer effort.
 - It will be in the Meadows and the Town will provide trash bags
 - Anticipating a reduction in volunteers from 100 to 50 or 60 due to the lack of raffle items.
 - Zoe noted that there is signage, including a banner, left over from last year. The Town's PA system can also be used for the event.
 - Heidi noted that she may be able to get TMVOA to provide some merchant gift certificates for raffle prizes.
- > <u>Agenda Item 12-</u> Composting Subcommittee Update
 - **NEXT STEPS:** Patrick Berry presented this item to the committee and discussion took place.
 - He has reached out to Montrose Producers Coop to get a chemical compound profile on the compost that is coming out of the machines. Results will be shared soon.
 - Two more composting machines are arriving today, and data collection has been good. Jonathan will get with Zoe to learn the editing portion of the real time data collection.
- Agenda Item 13- COVID 19 Workplan / Zero Waste Plan Integration:
 - **NEXT STEPS:** Cath Jett presented this item to the committee and discussion took place.
 - It is understood that the current year budget is still intact however, next year's budget is more at risk.
 - Projections have been built into the budget in case the Town enters crisis budget mode.
 - The committee will maintain its current path while being prudent with money.
 - Jonathan noted that it is important for the entire county to be completely responsible for its own waste stream.
 - As far as emissions goes, we have a solid direction with Lotus.
 - The 2008 Zero Waste Action Plan is impressive and contains many different initiatives that can be undertaken without a budget.
 - Cath asked that everyone read this plan and provide her with three top initiatives that we would like to accomplish this year. Deadline is next Tuesday.

Other Business:

Tyler Simmons with Eco Action Partners noted that plastic film collection has restarted so he encouraged everyone to remind people of this opportunity. There are three collection boxes in Mountain Village; one at Town Hall, one at TMVOA and one at Mountain Adventures.

There being no further business, on a **MOTION** by Jonathan Greenspan and seconded by Inga Johansson, the Green Team Committee voted unanimously to adjourn the meeting at 3:32 p.m.






Mountain Village's Greenhouse Gas Emissions

Mountain Villages' GHG Emissions (mt CO₂e)




Mountain Village's total emissions value for 2019 was 72,398 mt CO₂e. This represents a 27 percent reduction since the 2018 measurements.

Business-As-Usual Emissions Projection





Mountain Village's Climate Action Strategies

- Lotus modeled the impact of the climate action strategies that the Green Team Committee approved in the May meeting.
 - Note that not all strategies are anticipated to have a quantitative impact on emissions. Those that don't are not included in the model.
- Lotus selected targets for the strategies based on our knowledge of the Town's goals and work completed by other communities.
- The cumulative impact of the strategies based on current target levels is 57% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions by 2050 (from a 2010 baseline).


