OVERVIEW

In our last solar subcommittee meeting, it was determined that we need direction for how to administer the approximately \$40,000 in incentive funding earmarked for the solar program in 2021.

We determined that we cannot move forward with community outreach and promotion of this program until the parameters of the incentive have been established. Originally the program was intended to add value to the existing federal tax credits which were to sunset at the end of the year; those credits (26%) have been extended for two additional years with the most recent stimulus budget. While this allows more time for homeowners to take advantage of the federal credits, it is still imperative that the Green Team determine the best utilization of the incentive funds budgeted for this year. We agreed that this year's program should be considered a "Pilot" with opportunities to expand and enhance in the future (pending this year's outcomes and future budgets.)

In consideration of the options below, the Green Team should determine the target audience for this incentive program. Does this program seek to make solar installation a reality for low to moderate-income homes? Does it incentivize higher-value homes to go solar? Is there a one-size-fits-all incentive that would drive any income household to install solar? Additionally, where do HOAs fit in the scope and framework of the solar incentive program? Do special considerations need to be made to accommodate their specific needs and constraints?

The Green Team should also consider whether the existing permit fees for solar installation should be waived, reduced, or remain the same.

OPTIONS

A.) 1 & 2: Town-funded Financing Program

Under this option, the Mountain Village could subsidize loans for solar installation through one of two programs.

1. Interest Rate Buy-Down

Under this arrangement, the town would help lower the interest rate that property owners will have to pay to such a point that financing becomes an attractive option. In order to lower the rate, Mountain Village would make an upfront payment directly to the lender. The payment amount would need to be calculated based on the loan amount and other factors.

2. Loan Loss Reserve Funds

Many communities have used this framework to incentivize lenders to assume more risk than they normally would for certain loan applicants, thus providing more options for those seeking financing for solar installation. An RFP would need to be created and distributed to financial institutions in order to understand what products and options would be available and how those would lower costs for program participants.

Benefits of this approach would be that homeowners could gain significant savings on their loan. Drawbacks would be that either options would be complicated and time-consuming, and the incentive funds could be drawn down quickly.

B.) Low-income/Deed-restricted Rebate

This program could work similarly to the Farm to Community, whereby the Town subsidizes solar installation for income-qualified homes. It could be a fixed rebate payment made to qualified participants (e.g. \$1600 for the first 25 qualified homes), or a percentage of the installation costs paid via rebate up to a pre-determined maximum amount (funds distributed on a first-come, first-served basis.) Non-income qualified households would still be encouraged to join the co-op, but would not receive any additional incentive outside of the reduction in installation costs negotiated through the RFP process with the installer (they could still take advantage of the SMPA rebate and the federal tax credit.)

Benefits include that more funding could become available through local (TMVOA?) or State (energy office?) grants, thereby increasing the number or participants and/or the rebate amount; and the program would be relatively simple to roll out and explain to potential participants. Drawbacks would be that the rebate amount may still not be enough for some households to afford installation costs. Only offering the additional incentive to income-qualified households could also diminish the pool of interested participants.

C.) Fixed Rebate for all Co-op participants

This concept would offer a straight rebate (e.g. \$1600 for the first 25 participants) for anyone interested in joining the Co-op. Participants could have the option of donating their rebate to help a lower-income neighbor.

This is by far the simplest and most straightforward option. It would likely lead to the most participation in the co-op, which could have the potential to drive down installation costs for all

members. Concerns include that homeowners could take the rebate without really "needing" it, thereby leaving fewer rebate dollars available for those households who may have a more difficult time paying for solar and thus diminishing the pool of lower-income co-op participants.

OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

Should the Green Team request solar installation fees be waived for this program?

- Currently the building fee for solar installation is capped at \$500/home. Assuming 25 homes participate, this would result in \$12,500 in lost revenues for the Town.
- The Green Team could also suggest a reduction in fees, amount TBD.
